THE FATE OF EUROPE'S TREASURES

The Allies won on two fronts: the battlefield triumphs and the determination to save Europe's

artistic heritage from obliteration. As Allied forces fought the Nazis for Europe's freedom, there was another group of American and Art experts waging a comparable campaign to save and locate at-risk works of art and monuments that may be damaged or stolen during the chaotic war years, and then preserve them the best they could in the field. The true extent of the Nazi art theft was not fully realized until 1943. The entire contents of the Uffizi Museum, museums of Paris, and the treasures from many churches were taken by the Nazis, which they hid for use after the war. They were stored in underground storage facilities like the one located in the Austrian Alps at Alt Aussee, which comprised of more than 12,000 of some of the most important works destined for Hitler's Linz museum.

The mission to save artifacts, paintings, sculptures, and buildings was sanctioned by the Allied Commander Dwight D. Eisenhower. Writer Robert Edsel said, "You have to show respect for the things people value. You don't need to understand it or like it, but if you are going somewhere, you need to pay attention." These menhistorians, architects, artists, archaeologists, and archivists, known as the Venus Fixers-were dedicated in protecting and saving Renaissance art by whatever means necessary. Works of art that could not be moved to safety were ingeniously hidden. In Rome, the 70-foot-high Arch of Constantine was protected with sandbags and scaffolding. Michelangelo's eight-foot statue of Moses was encased in cloth and a brick wall built around it, as was his sculpture of David. Edsel further stated, "Saving these masterpieces was vital because people understand their importance to civilization."

While Italy was Germany's ally it was spared from pilfering during the first three years, but once their allegiance changed, German troops took whatever they could. President Roosevelt established the American Commission for the Protection and Salvage of Artistic and Historic Monuments in War Areas. Along with the War Department, maps of European cities and towns where significant monuments and religious sites were concentrated were used by bombing crews and commanders when planning operations. The Monuments, Fine Arts, and Archive Program (MFAA) ranks grew to more than 80 as the was progressed across Europe. They were charged to report on and bring first aid to damaged buildings and art treasures throughout Italy.

The Italian Campaign took 22 months from Sicily to the Alps. To the allies fighting in Italy amounted to conducting a war in a museum-through many beautiful cities and ancient little towns with innumerable masterpieces. The Venus Fixers fought to preserve that "museum" while dodging German attacks and Allied means to defend. The conditions were less than optimal, transportation inadequate, and resources few, they were able to initiate repair work on 700 historic buildings. Their mission as an art lover was both a nightmare and a dream.

At the beginning of the war, thousands of works of art had been secretly hidden from the Nazis in castles, villas and monasteries located in the countryside's. In Florence, more than 3000 crates were filled with paintings, sculptures, entire libraries, and archives and were threatened by the bombings. Michelangelo's sculptures of the Medici tombs were located in a garage of the Villa di Torre a Cona. Paintings from the Uffizi Galleries and Pitti Palace were discovered by chance in the Castle of Montegufoni. Stolen was the art work from the Villa of Poggio a Caiano in the Summer of 1944 and disappeared behind enemy lines.

Eventually, more than 500 pieces of art were uncovered in South Tyrol after Germany surrendered in May 1945. Loaded on 13 cars of a train, these were the first to cross the Po River to be returned to Florence. They arrived home on July 22, 1945. A more recent discovery of more than 1500 pictures were found in the apartment of Cornelius Gurlitt, son of a Nazi art dealer. It is a painful reminder that 73 years ago, while the task for the Venus Fixers was epic, they were still not able to avoid destruction of the Abbey of Monecassino or the devastation of Mantegna's Ovetari Chapel in Padua. On the other hand, monuments thought to be lost have been restored: Tempio Malatestiano in Rimini, many 17th century palaces in Turin and Genoa, and the Baroque churches of Palermo. The pervasive quality of Italian art is not only found in major museums but can also be found in a narrow Neapolitan alley or Umbrian town or a small city located away from the coastline of Sicily.
