

CSJ Report

The controversy to change Christopher Columbus Day to Indigenous People's Day continues and even school districts are jumping on the band wagon to include it in the academic calendars. One such school district's board of education, Southampton Union Free School District, recently approved the 2016-2017 school calendar until they were approached by a contingency of OSIA members voicing their displeasure and dissatisfaction with the change. The Board decided to draft a generic school calendar with the days not in session not marked as to whether they are holidays or conferences or whatever. In the meantime the Board requests that community groups meet to decide what those days should read and advise the Board. School boards are accessible and accountable to their communities. Through public advocacy and community engagement, school boards share their concerns and actions with the public, but school boards should not arbitrarily make changes without considering the ramifications of those decisions. The purpose of education is to make the world a better place, to provide an academically and socially well-balanced education of a high standard. Educational environment needs to encourage the pursuit of truth and values through the development of critical thinking skills and foster a spirit of learning and inquiry, which will continue throughout each student's life. Schools need to be committed to the spirit of international education and aim to create a coherent and caring school community, which emphasizes respect for individual and cultural diversity.

Colorado legislature's vote has put on hold, but this does not mean our vigilance should also be put on the back burner. Often times it is mere strategy "out of sight, out of mind". We must not let this slip through the cracks.

Continue to watch for local school board's 2016-2017 school calendars to see if there is a change from Columbus Day to Indigenous People's Day. We cannot arbitrarily make changes to a holiday that is imbedded in US history because of a few. All of us know of something that is offensive, either personally or as a group. Is it possible to create a community, a society, or a world where no one is ever offended? Do we offend another by our own offensiveness? Do we expect everyone to respond to our wants? Or can we live where we respect others' difference? Can we open our minds and learn what makes us who we are and others who they are? Can we celebrate along with others their culture and heritage as we hope others will celebrate with us? Education is the key to acceptance and understanding, the good and the bad, the struggles and the successes.

April Fools Day in Italy *pesce d'aprile (April's Fish)*

In Italy, as in much of the world, April 1st is traditionally a day of practical jokes, pranks, and silliness. The origin of this custom is ancient and ambiguous, but one thing is certain: much buffoonery and hilarity will take place.

The traditional *pesce d'Aprile* (April Fool's trick) in Italy consists of a youngster surreptitiously attaching - with the help of tape or glue - a paper cutout of a *pesciolino* (small fish) to the rear shoulders of a school companion. Then everyone jokingly questions: *L'hai visto?—Chi?—Il pesce d'Aprile!* (or *Have you seen?—Who?—the April Fool!*) and makes derisive remarks about the victim.

The more sophisticated adult pranks are classics such as false communiques from the Ministry of the Interior about Martians attacking: *"Sono sbarcati i marziani, chiudetevi tutti in casa,"* or rumors that money is being give out: *"Si distribuiscono soldi a tutti, andate in via Tal dei Tali al numero..."* Every year there are new pranks which oftentimes tricks gullible individuals. Usually the media reports on them the day after and ranks them *migliori pesci d'Aprile*. Not to miss out on a culinary opportunity, there's even a recipe for *ravioli al pesce d'aprile* to celebrate the occasion.

Liberation Day in Italy - April 25th *La Festa della Liberazione*

*"E questo è il fiore del partigiano ... morto per la libertà!
(This is the flower of the partisan ... who died for freedom)
"Bella Ciao"*

On April 25, you'll hear this refrain throughout every corner of Italy, sung on street corners by small groups, played on the radio or performed by bands in parades and local plazas. Set to the melody of a traditional folk song, "Bella Ciao" was the anthem of the Italian resistance movement during World War II, often sung by the left-wing anti-fascist rebels who fought against the atrocities of the Nazis and the leader of Italy, Benito Mussolini. Even today, the lyrics are symbolic of the sacrifices made for freedom.

While Italy has been a democratic republic since 1946, many Italians remember a time when they did not have such freedom. That history is honored throughout Italy on April 25 with *La Festa della Liberazione*, or Liberation Day, festivities. Every year, the entire country joins together to celebrate its liberation from the Nazis and pay tribute to those who lost their lives in the fight to free their country.

"OH PARTISAN, COME TAKE ME WITH YOU ..."

When Italy entered into an armistice with the Allies in 1943, thousands of Italians took up arms as part of the resistance to the fascist dictatorship of Benito Mussolini. No longer satisfied to live under Mussolini's control, the Resistance initially comprised independent soldiers who had once been members of Italy's many political parties — including more than 35,000 women. While the infighting among members of the resistance was sometimes fierce, the soldiers remained committed to the same cause: Italy's liberation. After two years of fighting and thousands of deaths, in April 1945, the Resistance successfully liberated several Italian cities. Over the course of four days, beginning on April 21, the soldiers freed Bologna, Parma, Reggio, Emilia, and, on the final day of uprising, Milan and Torino.

TORINO'S ROLE IN LIBERATION

While members of the Resistance fought bravely in every Italian city, perhaps nowhere was the loss felt more than in the industrial city of Torino, the center of Italy's car-making industry. Many of the workers in the factories and other establishments around the city refused to comply with the Wehrmacht, or German military forces. As a result, as many as 7,000 of the workers were taken to a concentration camp in Cefalonia, where they perished under harsh labor conditions or in lethal gas chambers.

LA FESTA DELLA LIBERAZIONE

While many festivals in Italy are only celebrated locally, Liberation Day is a "Red Day" on the calendar or a national holiday. Most of the country shuts down — including public buildings and transportation, and many restaurants — so citizens can attend parades, concerts, demonstrations, speeches and ceremonies honoring those who lost their lives at the hands of the Nazis, particularly the Resistance fighters.

The most elaborate celebrations occur in the capital city of Rome, notably the Italian president's annual visit to the Ardeatine Caves mausoleum, where 335 Romans were killed by Nazis in 1944. However, every city hosts events to honor the holiday. Even in smaller cities, like Torino, you'll find parades and other events taking place throughout the day.
